Preliminary Round 1

Bringing snacks and soft drink to junior high school should be allowed.

Closing schools to combat the COVID-19 has brought more benefits than harm.

Grand Final

Recreating the dead in VR does more benefits than harm.

Due to the recent outbreak of COVID-19, this event was held online. With cooperation of KDDI Foundation and Yamaha Cooperation, tablet PCs, Wi-Fi, and Yamaha speakers were sent to schools and students staying at home.



The opening ceremony began with introduction of participating and enrolled schools. Over 60 Zoom (online meeting service) accounts of students, teachers, parents, and spectators gathered in the main chat room (some schools participated using one account with multiple students). Rules of the competition were explained and POI (Point of Information) practice was held. Students who were nervous from their lack of practice due to the closing of schools seemed to relax from practicing POI. After that, procedures for judges and debate preparation using Zoom were explained.

Next, the first preliminary round began. Matchups and motions were presented in the main room, and students moved to different chatrooms, where they will debate. In each chatroom, PDA staff created breakout rooms (smaller sessions created in chatrooms) and divided students into Government and Opposition groups for preparation. The motion for round 1 was "Bringing snacks and soft drink to junior high school should be allowed." Points from the student's own experience, including harm to health and concentrating in class were debated. After the debate, the judges gave feedback, and the students asked questions to deepen their understanding.

Some teams were on one account, others participated from their homes.

Speeches were delivered to the judges across the screen.

The motion for round 2 was "Closing schools to combat the COVID-19 has brought more benefits than harm." The Government argued that it was beneficial for the prevention of spreading COVID-19, but the Opposition explained the current situation where ceremonies were cancelled and parents had to take days off for their children staying at home.

In addition to all the equipment mentioned above, VR goggles were distributed to each school, giving a real-life experience of the awarding ceremony. On this, PDA's Innovative officer Chihiro Nakagawa added that even without practice, taking part in this competition was a great chance for challenge and growth, and with the right tools, even more potential could be achieved. With this advice, the 3rd PDA Junior High School Parliamentary Debate National Competition came to a close.
