Purpose of the Event:

Recently, as the process of globalization accelerates, fostering talents that can contribute to a global society and understand cultural diversity and different ways of thinking has become one of the most important goals. The PDA High School Parliamentary Debate World Congress (PDA World Congress) aims to help participants nurture and strengthen their English-speaking skills, logical thinking, presentation skills, communication skills, general knowledge, and other various skills through active participation in British Parliamentary format debates. It is a wonderful opportunity for students from different countries to achieve personal growth while exchanging ideas and arguments on an equal footing. The primary purpose of this event is to motivate participants to grow into active talents of our global society. To better assist that process, we have included various educational opportunities such as keynote speeches and other contemporary lectures. Our main goal is to promote truly effective cultural exchanges using debate. Moreover, PDA High School Parliamentary Debate World Congress's schedule has been designed to resemble international / academic conferences. It is a unique experience for high school students as it provides them with a chance to visualize themselves being on an international stage.

Furthermore, PDA World Congress integrates the results of a research project supported by the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Sciences and Technology (MEXT) and uses an impromptu English debate format that can be used in a regular high school class (50 minutes). It is a format that is both familiar to the students who

have some experiences in debates through extra-curricular activities, and at the same time, friendly to the students who have no prior training in debates.

Motions: (Motions were announced 15 minutes before the beginning of each round)

<u>Preliminary round 1:</u> Living in rural areas is better than living in urban areas.

Preliminary round 2: Zoos should be banned.

<u>Preliminary round 3:</u> Disaster-affected marginal villages should move to other cities rather than rebuild.

*A marginal village is a village with over half the residents over the age of 65.

<u>Preliminary round 4</u>: African countries should prioritize environmental protection over economic development.

Semi Final: Politics is better done by AI than by humans.

<u>Grand Final:</u> STEM education is more important than language education for high school students.

First day (Opening Ceremony, Preliminary Round 1~3, Cultural Interaction/Culture Night)

The 9th PDAWC has commenced. During the opening ceremony, there were welcoming remarks from PDA Director Chihiro Nakagawa, as well as introductions of teams from various countries (26 teams from 13 countries, including 6 teams from Japan). After that, there was an explanation of the debate rules. On the first day of the competition, there were three rounds of preliminaries, international exchange activities, and a Culture Night (introducing the cultures of various countries). During the opening ceremony, participants watched introduction videos of the attending schools, confirming the diverse group of international peers they would be debating with. In the rule review, participants practiced Point of Information (POI) poses for questioning during debates and enhancing mutual understanding.

In the first round of the preliminaries, amidst visible tension, teams engaged in discussions while exchanging Point of Information (POI). Addressing the question of whether one should live in the countryside or the city, the government team argued that "the countryside is safer," while the negative team contended that "the city has more comprehensive healthcare services," leading to intense debates at some tables. Discussions on the topic of rural and urban living unfolded from various perspectives, including environmental and educational aspects. After the debates concluded, participants found opportunities for deeper exchange, sparked by topics such as whether their own residences were in the countryside or the city. Following the debates, all teams received feedback and improvements for the upcoming rounds from the judge.

The topic for the second round of preliminaries was whether zoos should be banned. During the subsequent exchange, participants discovered diverse backgrounds, such as some having no zoos, others having zoos but never visiting, and some having nature parks with animals instead of traditional zoos. This led to moments where perspectives were broadened through discussions like, 'I believe cultural backgrounds are also involved in this,' emphasizing the role of cultural diversity and the expansion of viewpoints through the debate and its topics.








After Culture Night, the third round of preliminaries took place, focusing on the ongoing debate surrounding the recovery and relocation of depopulated villages, a topic brought to light again by the 2024 Noto Peninsula Earthquake. Specific discussions were held on issues such as post-disaster reconstruction funds and the risk of facing another disaster. International teams also had the opportunity to learn more about each other's countries, with comments like 'We are familiar with the Noto earthquake through TV and social media' and 'While earthquakes are rare where we live, other disasters are a concern.' The discussion delved into the specific challenges of the recovery and relocation process.

The second day began with the fourth round of preliminaries, focusing on the topic 'African countries should prioritize environmental protection over economic development.' Given the participation of teams from Africa in the global exchange tournament, every team seemed to feel a personal connection to the challenge, leading to lively debates. Teams from the concerned African countries shared insights into their situations, and teams from other nations utilized their knowledge to engage in full-fledged debates. Even after the debates concluded, participants continued to deepen their discussions on the topic, providing an opportunity to enhance the interest of high school students worldwide in international issues.



The intense semifinals concluded, and as a result, Asano (1st in the preliminaries) and Sagamihara (2nd in the preliminaries) advanced to the grand final. The topic for the championship debate was 'STEM education is more important than language education for high school students.' In connection with this, a keynote speech by Dr. Somporn Chuai-Aree was delivered, emphasizing the role of software that facilitates programming in promoting STEM education. The students were observed attentively listening to the speech. In the final debate, discussions unfolded from various perspectives, including opportunities and necessities for learning after high school graduation. Judged by PDA certified educational judges and international educators, Asano High School emerged as the champion.


