Purpose of the Event:

Recently, as the process of globalization accelerates, fostering talents that can contribute to a global society and understand cultural diversity and different ways of thinking has become one of the most important goals. The PDA High School Parliamentary Debate World Congress aims to help participants nurture and strengthen their English speaking skills, logical thinking, presentation skills, communication skills, general knowledge and other various skills through active participation in British Parliamentary format debates. It is a wonderful opportunity for students from different countries to achieve personal growth while exchanging ideas and arguments on an equal footing. The primary purpose of this event is to motivate participants to grow into active talents of our global society. To better assist that process, we have included various educational opportunities such as keynote speeches and other contemporary lectures. Our main goal is to promote truly effective cultural exchanges using debate as a means to an end. Moreover, PDA High School Parliamentary Debate World Congress's schedule has been designed to resemble international/academic conferences. It is a unique experience for high school students as it provides them with a chance to visualize themselves being on an international stage.

Furthermore, PDA High School Parliamentary Debate World Congress integrates the results of a research project supported by the

Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Sciences and Technology (MEXT) and uses an impromptu English debate format that can be used in a regular high school class (50 minutes). It is a format that is both familiar to the students who have some experiences in debates through extra-curricular activities, and at the same time, friendly to the students who have no prior training in debates.

Motions: (Motions were announced 15 minutes before the beginning of each round)

Preliminary round 1: Tobacco should be banned.

Preliminary round 2: Ambulance services should be paid rather than free.

Preliminary round 3: It is better to have romantic relationships with humanoid robots than with humans.

Preliminary round 4: Organ donation should be mandatory.

Semi Final: Tariffs do more benefits than harm.

Grand Final: Accepting immigrants brings more benefits than harms.

First day (Opening Ceremony, Preliminary Round 1~3, Cultural Interaction/Culture Night)

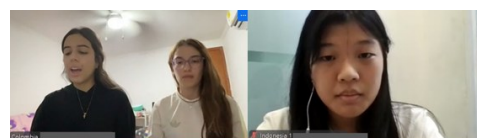
The 11th PDA World Exchange Tournament took place online. During the opening ceremony, participants watched introduction videos of each school and became acquainted with the peers from various countries with whom they would be debating. The ceremony included greetings from Chihiro Nakagawa, the Representative Director of PDA, followed by an explanation of the debate rules. During the rule's session, students practiced the POI (Point of Information) gesture and reviewed how to use it effectively to promote mutual understanding. On the first day of the tournament, three preliminary rounds were held, along with a Culture Night, where participants introduced cultures from around the world. While waiting for the judges to announce the results after each debate in each round, teams exchanged views on the contexts and backgrounds related to the motions.

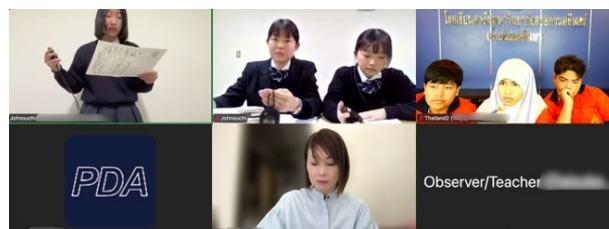

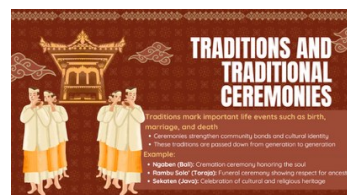

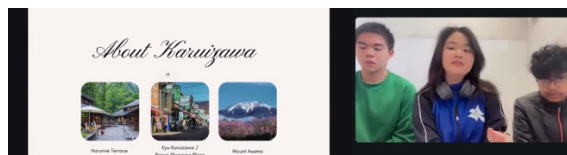
